Being an eco-church is not a phase that we are going through. It is not an optional add-on to our discipleship. It is not a fashionable project that will be here today and gone tomorrow. Here at St Paul's we have



always understood, from centuries of biblical Christian understanding, that we are stewards of God's own creation; trusted by Him to care for this planet as part of our worship.

A growing number of members of our church are increasingly concerned over rates of biodiversity loss, ecosystem collapse and climate change, and we are hearing God's call to play our part in changing our own lifestyles and campaigning for environmental protection.

As people who take seriously the command of Jesus to 'love our neighbour' we know that that includes the poorest people on earth who are most affected by environmental damage, as well as the generations to come who will inherit the earth from us.

Caring for creation

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Why we should care for creation

The Bible teaches us that the earth is the Lord's (Psalm 24 v I), and that all things have been created through and for Jesus (Colossians I v I6). If we love the Lord our God, we should cherish and protect his creation.

Caring for creation is also a key part of loving our neighbour. When creation is damaged through climate breakdown or pollution, people suffer. And the poor, those whom the Bible tells us we should particularly care for, are the most affected. Failing to look after creation is failing to love our neighbour.

The news about climate breakdown, wildlife extinctions and pollution can seem overwhelming. In a time of fear, the church has the opportunity to bring hope. As a church, we can demonstrate love for our neighbour and care for God's creation through every aspect of our church life, including:

- worship, prayer and teaching about caring for creation
- making sure our church buildings do not damage the environment
- managing church land in a way that allows our wild neighbours to flourish
- engaging with our community and the world on issues such as climate breakdown, pollution & species loss
- encouraging our church family to live in a way that cares for God's creation

What has St Paul's Dorking done as a church?

Over the last few years we have made a number of changes to improve our impact on creation, including:

Worship and Teaching

- Creation Matters small group Bible studies
- · Sermons on caring for creation

Buildings

- Switched to green electricity
- Replaced energy-hungry lights with efficient LEDs

Land

- Developed a management plan for our church land
- Encouraged native wildflowers

Community and global

- Co-organised Dorking Eco Fair, highlighting the work of local organisations that care for the environment
- Introduced food waste collection in the church kitchen

Lifestyle

- Encouraged members to audit their carbon footprint
- Held a 'Swish' clothes swap event
